Informatsioon Malta kohta, millest täna juttu oli – see sertifikaadi lühendamise puudutab ainult **MALTA enda väljastatud sertifikaate** (vt allpool punasega eraldi välja toodud). Teiste riikide, sh Eesti väljastatud sertifikaatide kehtivusaega ei ole lühendatud. Info sai üle kontrollitud ka Eesti konsuli poolt Roomas (katame sealt Maltat).

Validity requirements for foreign vaccine certificates are as per the requirements of the country issuing the certificate, provided that the last dose was administered at least 14 days prior.

Vaccination Certificate Required for Travel to Malta
Travel requirements from Monday 17th January:

Adults Aged 18 Years & Over

To be considered valid, [vaccine certificates issued by the Maltese Authorities](#) for **adults aged 18 years and over** must confirm that the person has received one of the following:

- Primary vaccination schedule* with last dose administered not more than 3 months previously.

OR

- Primary vaccination schedule* and booster with last dose of booster administered not more than 9 months previously.

Children Aged 12-17 Years

To be considered valid, vaccine certificates issued by the Maltese Authorities for **children aged 12-17 years** must confirm that the person has received the **primary vaccination schedule***.

***Primary schedule: the initial course of vaccination as recommended by the vaccine manufacturer, i.e. two doses of Spikevax (Moderna), Comirnaty (Pfizer) or Vaxzevria (Astrazeneca), or one dose of the Janssen (Johnson & Johnson) vaccine.**

Temporary Exemption criteria for passengers travelling with a Vaccination Certificate issued by the Maltese Authorities

Persons who have a valid residency card and are returning to Malta between the 17th January 2022 and 1st February 2022 would be granted a temporary exemption, with respect to the validity of the vaccine certificate, in line with these standards. This thus allows them to enter Malta with the vaccine certification requirements in place prior to the 17th January 2022. Following this date, persons who do not possess a valid vaccine certificate will be asked to undergo a period of 14 days quarantine on their arrival.

Exemption

Those persons who have a valid residency card and who were already abroad as of the 17th January 2022 and are repatriating back to Malta will be exempt from quarantine if they have a vaccination certificate with a primary schedule of vaccination, provided they provide a negative PCR test carried out within 72 hours prior to arrival to Malta and would have applied for and take the booster dose within 5 days from arrival to Malta. This exemption does not apply to persons returning from dark red zones.

The above does not apply to passengers travelling to Malta who reside in foreign countries.

Egiptuse osas:

Ametlikku informatsiooni vaktsineerituse tõendi (Covid vaccination certificate) kehtivusaja kohta (180 p või muu) ei ole. Kuna ametlikku informatsiooni ei ole, ei ole ka reeglit, mille kohaselt saaks keegi piiril öelda, et 180 päeva tagasi saadud doos on liiga „vana“.

Saatkond helistas täna ka Hurghada lennujaama ning sealt öeldi, et 180-päeva-reeglit ei ole. Ainus reegel on, et viimasest doosist peab olema möödas 14 päeva ja mitte vähem. Isegi kui viimane doos saadi 180 p või rohkem tagasi, siis see tõend kehtib. Hoiame silmad lahti ja anname teada, kui midagi muutuma peaks.
